

GROUP CHAIR'S REPORT

I would like start my report as always by inviting all members, families and supporters to the 1st Tolworth (St. Matthew's) Scout Group Annual General Meeting to be held at Sparks Hall on Tuesday 7th June 2022.

Please do come along and join us. It would be great to see as many of you as possible. The meeting will start at 20.00 and again we have the opportunity to reflect on the previous year's

activities. The formal meeting is usually a reasonably short affair. Refreshments, drinks and nibbles will be available following the meeting. Use this opportunity to raise any concerns you may have regarding the way the Scout Group is managed or just come along for a chat. It would be great to see you there.

At the time of writing this report, we are almost back to a normal way of life in the UK. Hopefully, our St. George's Day Service and yearly Awards Presentations, the first one in three years, scheduled for after the deadline of the reports, will be a success.

To continue:

This report as always will be a review of the last year.

As you are aware, we had some changes in our Leadership and Group Executive roles. John Bowman took over from Reg Lefevre as our Group Scout Leader, Megan Taylor was officially welcomed as "Akela" Cub Scout Leader and Tina Lefevre took over from longstanding Sheila Jones as Group Secretary. And I am pleased to say they all survived their first year in these roles.

The Scout Troop were back with face to face meetings as soon as the Covid restrictions were eased. By the end of September the Cub and Beaver sections were also meeting face to face and we were starting to feel normality returning.

Well done and thanks to Caroline, Megan, Rachel and your teams for all your efforts.

We even had, on a smaller scale than normal, our November Fayre planned which was a great success only made possible due to our very dedicated Fayre Planning Committee. As we hadn't had the opportunity to hold our yearly presentation service during the pandemic John took the opportunity to present some of the awards missed over the previous two years.

The Remembrance Sunday service held at Surbiton War Memorial, another event that was welcomed back after the lockdowns, was well attended and it was great to see so many people in attendance and great to see so many youth group members there including those from 1st Tolworth, all looking really smart. The 1st Tolworth Scout Group wreath, which is normally laid at the Polyapes War Memorial, was laid by our treasurer Terry Goodall.

Our Group minibus following the two years of inaction is back on the road. However, it is looking rather untidy, even after the wash and brush up we gave it. Thanks to Richard Ford for getting the bus back in working order. The Executive Committee have discussed replacing the minibus, not only because of its age but also because of the ever threat of the expanding ULEZ, which if it did extend to Surbiton would cost the Group £16 every day it was used.

During the summer months and before all the sections were fully back meeting in the hall, the Group Executive Building Maintenance team replaced the six florescent lights in the hall and one in the stairwell. These were replaced with "daylight glow" LED lights. The hall also had a thorough clean. Using the tower we hired so the lights could be replaced, we cleaned the RSJ's and steelwork that supports the roof.

The metal tables that were propped up against the climbing wall have been put into the outside storage area. At the same time the climbing wall had some work done. Evidently, the karabiner arrangements we were using were no longer the correct method and were replaced. There is a climbing technique called Bouldering which limits the height you can climb up the wall. A red line denotes this height. But the idea of Bouldering is to move across the wall.

The benefit of this is that no instructor is required so all sections can do this activity as part of a normal section meeting. Unfortunately we still have some safety issues with using the wall for full height climbing and these are being addressed.

The new Group Website is almost ready to launch and I would like to thank Staxoweb for their efforts and support in bringing this about.

Sad News

Unfortunately we lost a dedicated Scouter and long-time supporter of 1st Tolworth when Barry Pegram, Father Christmas for many years at our November Fayre, sadly died in July.

On March 5th 2022 the Group celebrated its 113th year since being founded. None of those 113 years would have been possible if it wasn't for the volunteers past and present who take on the roles as Group Scout Leader, Beaver, Cub and Scout Leaders, Assistant Leaders, Young Leaders or Executive Committee members and the regular helpers who all do so without any payment and in some cases, with cost to themselves. Thank you all.

I would like to thank the Group Executive members for their support during the last year and look forward to their continued support in the next. Although mainly in the background, the Executive Committee does a wonderful job in managing the Group's funds and assets so I would like to take this opportunity on behalf of everyone in the 1st Tolworth family to thank them for their support. And a big thank you to my wife, Viv, as without her continuous support and understanding I could not fulfil my role as Group Chair.

Looking Forward

As previously reported, Graham Warnes decided it was time to step down from his role as Jumble Sales Manager. Graham, with the help of his lead team of Ken Warnes and Margaret Warry and his extended team of volunteers, has done a marvellous job over many years managing the Jumble Sales. And we thank them. However, as we had no volunteers forthcoming to take on this role, as a Group we have had no choice but to cease holding any further Jumble Sales.

As you can imagine, the funds raised from not only the Jumble Sales but also the Car Boot Sales and other Fayres Graham and his team attended, have greatly contributed to the Group's income and helped to keep the subs at a reasonably low cost.

As an example, the costs of keeping the Group running for a year are approximately £8,500, made up of the following:

Membership fees £2700 (based on 60 members)

Hall insurance including equipment £1700 (based on last year)

Minibus insurance (£1000 comprehensive)

Road tax £280. MOT £58

Council Tax £240 (only 4 payments of £60 this year). This will increase.

Electricity £1200

Water £240

Scout shop (badges) £1000

Fire Extinguisher yearly Safety Inspection £80

Currently our subs income is £500 a month which is £6000 a year so we are not breaking even. Gift Aid can add to this and was about £500 for the last 12 months.

The November Fayre could, if we have a good one, bring in a further £2000 if all goes well. We currently have a small financial buffer but as a Group we will not be able to survive for

long on just about breaking even so unfortunately a rise in subs will be on the Executive Committee's agenda in the coming year.

The last 26 months have certainly been a challenge to us all with unusual and unprecedented times. Hopefully as we enter the Group's 114th year we can get back to normality and look forward to another year of great Scouting. I'm sure that whatever the future holds for us we will, in true 1st Tolworth family tradition, rise to the challenges that present themselves and we will continue to do what we do best - provide great times, life skills and excellent Scouting for the youngsters in the area.

What a joy it is to be back meeting on Friday evenings, planning camps, being so busy that I haven't got enough time to do everything, ie. back to normal!

With Atlas ESU opening and meeting at Sparks Hall, lots of our older members, now Explorer-age, have left us but all have gone rather later than they should. Two have achieved Chief Scout's Gold – even tougher than usual with the events of the last 2 years - and I am very proud of them. Four more of our members will have moved up by Half-Term, two of them very close to their "Gold" and having had the chance to be Patrol Leaders. We will be back to under14's in the Troop then. Mind you, it is a real treat to have the older ones to call

on when I need some support, but knowing they are doing what Explorers do, for the rest of the time.

Because we had a gap with very few coming to join us from Everest Pack, we have been able to take in "refugees" from other Groups in the District who were unable to re-open their Troops after lockdown. On the other hand, 6th.Tolworth was able to re-start their Troop so one Scout went back (although two decided to stay with us instead!) and we haven't got an obligation to take more Cubs from them. This has given us a rich Troop in the way of experience and personalities. However, we have 10 Cubs to join us from Everest between March and September this year so we should be back to our usual numbers of just over 30 Scouts by the end of 2022.

Having done our best to build on Scouting skills over Zoom, it was a relief to return to face-to-face after half-term last summer. We met outdoors until the restrictions eased by September and went to Polyapes to try out their new Shooting/Archery Range and revise our fire-lighting and axe/saw skills.

Once back in the Hall, we have returned to our usual mix of navigation, cooking, crafts, games, sports, world themes, badge work etc. etc.

We have had five Jack Petchey Awards recently and have a stock of trips out saved until the time when the Group minibus was back on the road.

County Cooking Competition was back last October. The theme was "The Continents of the World". 3 courses, each from a different continent. 2 hours. 4 Scouts. 2 Gaz burners. Tough!! We entered 2 teams who came 4th & equal 5th out of 21 teams and were the top teams in Royal Kingston so came home with the District Trophy. We don't often collect silverware, so nice for a change. Well done to all.

The County Night Exercise was in March and our two teams both completed the course, finishing 13th & 21st. This is out of 43 teams that started and 23 that completed the course. I was very pleased with how well they did. We hadn't concentrated to doing well for that event. We had just carried on with our balanced programme, giving them enough skills to take part, without any panic training! As usual, there were many members of 1st.Tolworth joining in the organisation of the event and enabling other Scouts to take part.

We did manage to go to Summer Camp at Phasels Wood last July. It was the first week of camping and that made it complicated, as well as very last minute. I had been hassling the wardens for weeks to know if we could go. So much so that I was christened "That mad woman from Tolworth"! They got that one right, I suppose.... We took 14 Scouts, three Young Leaders and 6 adults. We all so enjoyed being together again, doing what we all love and do best. We almost had the campsite to ourselves and if you have been to Phasels, you know how much freedom that is!

Since then, we have done 2 overnight Expeditions, one last autumn and one in the spring, both starting locally, camping at Polyapes overnight and walking on to finish in Effingham. It is so important to catch up on the opportunities that the Scouts should have had!

We have a weekend camp planned at Buckmore Park Scout campsite which will happen between writing this and the AGM, as well as members going to the National Archery competition with the District Archery Club. Summer Camp is booked too.

As to the leadership team, Stuart & Alex have gone travelling for the whole of 2022 but on the plus side we have acquired several of the Young Leaders who have now turned 18, but probably only until they disappear to University in the autumn. Jamie has returned to us after a few years absence and of course John does not have the obligation to be with us all the time with his new role. With several of the team also running Atlas, the roles and priorities get blurred sometimes, but we cope, and thrive.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Group's accounts cover the period from the 1st April 2021 to the 31st March 2022 and have been audited and signed off by Maurice Grant, the Independent Examiner. Thank you once again Maurice. The accounts are in a healthy state for the time being and have fared well during the last two years when Covid had forced closure of our Group due to various national lockdowns. Having given our parents the choice to cancel and suspend subs payments, 18 parents continued to pay throughout those 24 months and I thank them for supporting us.

I also applied for five grants of different amounts made available via Kingston Council from the Government. We were successful with all five and these grants are now a backup for our future finances. Our outgoings had been minimal during those two years but with Scouting returning last September our costs are now on the rise.

Our minibus was unused for almost two years. This kept the cost down as it was SORN and only had fire and theft insurance. The Group decided we needed to get the vehicle back on the road so it was usable again for Scouting. The cost of repairing, road tax, MOT and comprehensive insurance cost over £900. There are still some issues to be addressed regarding the cost of other repairs but there is some debate about replacing it with a newer model. We could just sell our present vehicle and hire one when needed. Discussions are ongoing at our monthly Executive Committee meetings about all options available.

Once again many thanks to Richard Ford for his continuing support with maintaining the minibus. Also thanks to all who recently turned out to wash and clean the bus in the car park of the Royal British Legion.

I mentioned that our costs were increasing back to pre-Covid levels but our income is now much lower than it was. Our fundraising has been greatly reduced with our yearly three Jumble Sales having now ceased. The last one was in March 2020. Also, Outdoor Fairs were

cancelled and some even this year are not taking place. During 2021, Car Boot sales continued to bring in welcome income. The last ones attended were in December last year.

We must thank Graham Warnes and his team for years of fundraising which helped boost our coffers and increased our spending power. Alas, Graham has said his years of fundraising are ending due to his advancing years. He has organised, collected, set up, distributed and sold many items along with the help of many others. He, Margaret and his brother Ken, were sometimes the only people from the Group attending outdoor events at the crack of dawn in all sorts of weather. So Graham and team, we salute you for all the dedication and hard work and funds you have put in for 1st Tolworth over many, many years. One BIG thank you.

I may go on about **Gift Aid** and how it is important for our Group, even more now than ever before. We have a full complement of parents who are eligible to sign a **Gift Aid form** but many have chosen not to. Some may not even know they can. It costs them nothing to complete and costs the Group nothing too, as long as the parent is a basic tax payer. I can claim 25% of all total subs contributions in a taxable year. Also, I can claim back up to four years, if applicable. It makes so much sense and helps to finance our Group. Unfortunately, I am only claiming about £400 to £500 later this year when, in the past, I was able to claim at least £1000. It is such a shame that something that is so easy to do is being wasted and which would improve the Group's income.

The hall insurance seems to go up every year and last year it was over £1700. This covers all the buildings and contents. This still had to be fully paid despite the hall not being used due to lockdowns. I am looking into quotes from other insurers to possibly reduce our premium if possible for this year.

The bill for our membership which covers our youngsters for this year has come to £2700 That is £45 a member. I can remember not so long ago when it was £30 a member. If we had 100 members our bill would have been £4500! No doubt this cost will inevitably increase next year.

We are now paying Council Tax again which is greatly reduced because we are a charity. We were paying £122 for the last year but that was for two payments of £61.

The monthly water rates from Castle Water were quite high last year and the company was still taking full monthly payments even though the hall was shut. I managed to get the company to reduce the direct payment and not pay anything for a few months. This may change again depending on when the meter readings are taken.

One major bill increase will be electricity from EDF as our hall is all electric. We will see all our power bills going up by at least 54% and even more in October. I don't have to tell you how important it is to switch off lights and heating when not being used. I estimate the hall bills for the next 12 months will be at least £1500 plus, instead of around £800 to £900 before the pandemic. Thank goodness the summer season is now upon us to help for the time being.

Our Scout Shop is also being used regularly with new leader uniforms, badges and other bits and pieces being purchased. Since we have returned to Scouting we have spent £800 in total. Also, all section expenses have steadily increased too and have to be reimbursed to leaders and helpers.

I do not want to press any panic buttons at this moment in time but our Group needs to assess the next 6 months. Our current account is in the black and the grants are there as a backup but with the current spending I wonder how long the current account will last before being topped up from the grants or the savings account. Only time will tell.

We did raise £600 at a downsized November Fayre last year which was well attended. Thanks to everybody who helped out. Hopefully the Group can stage our normal Fayre this November. This would be our main fundraiser event so I hope it will do well.

I would just like to thank Martin Smith, our Chair, and all the committee members, plus my dear wife, Carol, for all their support over the last 12 months. Also, thanks to Reg Lefevre for his time as GSL and welcome to John Bowman as our new GSL.

I've got to say a big thank you to Sheila Jones for her role as Group Secretary for over 40 years and has now decided recently to step down. Well done to Tina Lefevre for taking on the position as secretary.

Finally, it was great to be back in the hall for our Group Executive meetings after many months spent doing meetings by Zoom. The only Zoom I knew before this facility came along was an ice lolly!

CAR BOOT SALES £2983-10
