Team A, Their starter was called Cucumber Spring. For their main dish they had a huge volcano made of mashed potato, lava made of gravy and a dinosaur which was actually a chicken nugget. They made churros for their dessert and served it all with some cherryade.

Team B made peppers filled with cream cheese and wrapped with pastry for their starter, their main dish was a chickpea curry with sticky rice and samosas and their dessert was apples, cut and sculpted to look like birds in Greek yogurt and raspberries. Their funny factor was googly eyes on the samosas and peppers, and they had a number of jokes lined up for each dish.


